TCU Portfolio

(161 scholarship programs in 2023-24)

Unique to <u>Full Circle</u> Portfolio

- Awards are managed by the College Fund scholarships team.
- Awards include wrap-around services (e.g., coaching, career development)
- Available to mainstream and TCU-enrolled students

Similarities

- Both programs use one College Fund scholarship application
- Enrolled tribal member or descendent of a member
 - Minimum GPA of 2.0
- Must attend accredited college

Unique to <u>TCU</u> Portfolio

- Scholarships housed at College Fund but recipients are chosen by each TCU's financial aid office
- TCU scholarships do not include wrap-around services
- · Available for TCU students only

Application for the 2025-26 academic year closes on January 30, 2026.

Students who haven't applied should do so as soon as possible to be considered for a TCU award!



The number of Full Circle Scholars has **more than doubled** since the Fall of 2022, and the average annual survey response rate has **increased by 14 percentage points.**



The percent of Scholars who feel that the **Coaching programming has contributed to their success** has **continued to increase** since the Spring of 2023.





Goal 1:


TCUs will document an increase in their institutional capacity to deliver culturally reflective holistic student support services and relevant degree programs to promote student engagement and completion.

SEM Components and the Student Experience SEM Committee Roles & Representation







Impacts of CNSS

Strong, reciprocal learning community

Improved interdepartmental collaboration

Structure, external support, and dedicated space to build capacity while centering Native student success

Engaging, Holistic, and Flexible

Promotes connectedness and intentionality

Space and structure to build something meaningful and lasting

CNSS has pushed the college to engage more intentionally with cultural context, tribal priorities, and community narratives as part of [our] institutional research framework. This process has shifted our mindset from compliance-based reporting to relationship-based inquiry.

[We] now consider how data collection and dissemination can honor ways of knowing, support language revitalization, and reflect [our] definition of success.

By grounding this work in cultural relevance and community, we are able to see data not just as numbers but as [our] story and [our] commitments – to our students, our people, and our future.
