Fall Enrollment Update



We are thrilled to share the positive trends from our latest Fall 2025 Enrollment Report (Census 1)—our numbers are up! Lemlmtš ~ hu suki‡qukni!

These strong gains demonstrate our SKC community's unwavering commitment to fulfilling the College's mission.

Key highlights include:

- Student Headcount is 697.
- Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) is 725.
- Tribal Student Enrollment is 71%.
- Flathead Reservation Permanent Residence Students: At 66%.
